**LP** TONY EASTLEY: has learnt that some of the information presented in the case against Gold Coast doctor Mohammed **Haneef** may have been incorrect.

In Brisbane, the court was told that **Haneef's** SIM card was found in the car that was smashed into Glasgow airport. But it seems the facts are not as they were presented in the court. has been told by sources in the UK and Australia that the SIM card was first seized by police eight hours later, when a man was arrested in Liverpool.

**RAFAEL EPSTEIN:** Last year when Mohammed **Haneef** left Britain, he gave the SIM card for his mobile phone to his cousin, Sabeel Ahmed. When Mohammed **Haneef** appeared in a Brisbane court last Saturday, the prosecutor acting for the Government, Clive Porritt, spoke about the SIM card. He said it was found inside the Jeep Cherokee vehicle that had been smashed into Glasgow airport on June the 30th.

That was a cited as a reason behind the charge that Mohammed **Haneef** had recklessly supported a terrorist organisation. Placing his SIM card at the scene of the failed attack was also part of the prosecution's argument opposing Mohammed **Haneef's** bail. Here's what happens now when you call that mobile phone number.

(sound of mobile dialling and 'unavailable' mobile answering machine message) has been told that SIM card was not in the Jeep in Glasgow, but was obtained by British police eight hours later and 360 kilometres away in Liverpool. That's when Sabeel Ahmed was arrested by police using a taser electric shock gun, on Saturday the 30th of June, at around 11pm.

The jeep attack was at 3.15pm on the same day. understands Sabeel Ahmed had two mobile phones on him at the time. One of them is said to have contained the SIM card given to him by Mohammed **Haneef** last year.

Police in Britain and Australia will not comment on where the SIM card was found.If this is it is verified officially, it would mean Mohammed **Haneef's** SIM card was with a man charged only with withholding information. And Mohammed **Haneef** would no longer have that link to the attack in Glasgow.

Sabeel Ahmed's brother, Kafael Ahmed, was last night charged as a co-conspirator. Kafael Ahmed had to be wrestled to the ground after he emerged from the flaming jeep at the airport. Doctors are unsure if he'll survive his severe burns.
